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Take a Closer Look

At first glance you might think that you have stumbled across a bygone age when you see electric-driven trams trundling along ancient tracks, journeying from Colyton to Seaton, on the coast of Devon in the UK.

But take another look at the cover photograph. The trams may be

ancient, but look at the people on the top deck. One is using a digital camera and, from their hairstyles and clothing, these are evidently 21st century folk.

So you are not in a time warp after all! Seaton Tramway is a reconstruction intended to give a taste of Victorian times when trams were to be found in most large cities in Britain, and the passengers are tourists.

The Full Picture

Every day we make judgements like that about things we see and hear. We exercise all our senses, when we are alert and thinking clearly, to sort out what is true and what is not.

A letter arrives telling you that you have been left a fortune by someone you have never heard of before and you are invited to send your bank account details so that a money transfer can be made. Walking through the market someone offers to sell you perfume at a vastly reduced price, compared with its retail value. Or you see an advertisement offering a free

holiday in an exotic location. In each case you have to use your critical faculties and decide:

- that the letter is a hoax (and the bank transfer would be out of your account not into it):
- b. that the perfume is not the genuine article but a fake; and
- c. that the holiday offer is a way of luring you to a sales presentation.

It's a matter of being able to see beyond the immediate and work out what's behind it all. God has given us the ability to think things through, but we have to use those faculties if we are to make sensible decisions. Otherwise we can be easily fooled.



Think it through...

Over 2500 years ago an Old Testament prophet called Isaiah invited his nation to reason things

through with God their Maker. This is what he said:

"'Come now, and let us reason together,' says the LORD, 'Though your sins are like scarlet, they shall be as white as snow; though they are red like crimson, they shall be as wool. If you are willing and obedient, you shall eat the good of the land; but if you refuse and rebel, you shall be devoured by the sword'; for the mouth of the LORD has spoken" (Isaiah 1:18-20).

It was a challenging offer which said in effect: "Think about this: obey and prosper or disobey and die!" As it hap-

pened, the nation was facing desperate times; a foreign invader threatened its very existence. If ever there was a time to think seriously about God, this was it. But amazingly many people continued to put their trust in worthless idols and paid no attention to what God had to offer. So Isaiah invited them to take a closer look at their worship.

Worshipping a Tree

In a brilliant analysis, the prophet depicts a man chopping down a tree, using the chippings to make a fire on which he cooks his dinner, and then falling down to worship the rest of the timber which he has carved into an image depicting a god. Read the passage for yourself if you want to chuckle over the stupidity of people from long ago (Isaiah 44:9-20).

But beware! We can

be just as stupid today if

we spend our energy chasing after material things, and wanting more of them, when we should be using every opportunity to find out about God and His purpose with mankind – ourselves included. As a New Testament writer succinctly observed:

"Therefore put to death your members which are on the earth: fornication, uncleanness, passion, evil desire, and covetousness, which is idolatry" (Colossians 3:5).

The apostle Paul was saying the same thing as Isaiah (who wrote over 600 years before him). It is so easy to waste life's opportunities on desires,

feelings and wants. All we are really doing then is worshipping things and passions. We need to take a closer look at what God has to say, and what He has to offer.

Using our Senses

The Bible is a book about people who were given the opportunity to encounter God and to establish a relationship with Him. Some did and some didn't; it was a matter of per-

sonal choice. Their experiences are recorded so that we can learn from them if we are willing to take a close look at what happened and why. We can learn the hard way, from our own mistakes; or we can learn from the mistakes and successes of others. It's up to us to choose.

Reviewing some Old Testament history, the apostle Paul once said:

"Now all these things happened to them as examples, and they were written for our admonition, on whom the ends of the ages have come. Therefore let him who thinks he stands take

heed lest he fall" (1 Corinthians 10:11,12).

God challenges us to learn about Him and His ways if we want to. Nobody forces us to but we are assured that if we make the effort it will be the best thing ever. What we need to do is to use all our faculties to consider the facts. In this issue we invite you to look at what the Bible has to say about some key issues and to compare that with man-made notions about such things as evolution and fortunate accidents.

The Bible is Relevant

One of the convincing things about the Bible is the way it has foretold the future so accurately. Do you realise that you can make sense of the world in which we live by taking a closer look at prophecy? Did you know that the complex and difficult situation between

Israel and the Arab nations is foretold in the Bible? Did you know that Jesus spoke of a time when many people would be worried to death about the future?

"...On the earth distress of nations, with perplexity, the sea and the waves roaring; men's hearts failing them from fear and the expectation of those things which are coming on the earth, for the powers of heaven will be shaken. Then they will see the Son of Man coming in a cloud with power and great glory" (Luke 21:25-27).

Or alternatively, burying their heads in the sand and just living for the present?

"As it was in the days of Noah, so it will be also in the days of the Son of Man: they ate, they drank, they married wives, they were given in marriage, until the day that Noah entered the ark, and the flood came and destroyed them all" (Luke17:26,27).

Guidance for Life

The Bible is full of wisdom. It contains much practical advice about healthy living and positive relationships. Many of the laws from Moses' time are the bedrock of public health. 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Bible Prophecy

One way of establishing the truth of the Bible is by checking out its forecasts about the future. It has an established track record, as **Alex Mothersdill** now explains, for God's prophets foretold events that were due to come to pass in the near future so that we can have confidence that their long-term predictions are equally reliable. God has a plan for this earth which He has told us about in advance.

Jerusalem Besieged

The country was at war. The Assyrian army, the most powerful in the world at that time, laid siege to the capital, Jerusalem. By human reckoning there was no way out. The city was doomed to fall to the cruel Assyrians and their king, Sennacherib. The king of Judea at that time was Hezekiah and, according to an ancient inscription, he was shut up in Jerusalem like a caged bird. The situation was hopeless and all appeared to be lost.

There was, however, a prophet of God named Isaiah in the city and he was sent to King Hezekiah with this message:

"Thus says the LORD concerning the king of Assyria: 'He shall not come into this city, nor shoot an arrow there, nor come before it with shield, nor build a siege mound against it. By the way that he came, by the same shall he return; and he shall not come into this city,' says the LORD" (2 Kings 19:32,33).

Any sane person living in Jerusalem at that time would have considered these to be the words of a mad man, spoken perhaps to try to raise the people's spirits. There appeared to be no way at all in which the city could be saved from the powerful Assyrian army which was camped at its gates. But the city was saved and the prophecy was fulfilled as we read a little later in the same chapter:

"It came to pass on a certain night that the angel of the LORD went out ... and when people arose early in the morning, there were the corpses – all dead. So Sennacherib king of Assyria departed and went away, returned home, and remained at Nineveh" (19:35,36).

Double-Check

It may be claimed that this is not satisfactory evidence of prophecy being fulfilled because it is all contained in the Bible - there is no external evidence that the events ever took place. But there is! The Assyrian kings were very boastful of their conquests. In the British Museum there is a sixsided clay prism, generally known as Sennacherib's Cylinder, which records eight of his expeditions including the siege of Jerusalem during the reign of Hezekiah. Sennacherib speaks of shutting up Hezekiah in a cage and taking vengeance upon anyone who came out of the city, but there is no reference at all to the capture of the city a major event that he would certainly not have omitted to chronicle had it taken place.

What God's prophet Isaiah had foretold came to pass exactly as predicted, although it might have seemed impossible at the time the forecast was made. There was a reason for this prediction, for it established Isaiah's credentials as a prophet. Earlier in the

Bible God set out the way in which a prophet could be tested:

"When a prophet speaks in the name of the LORD, if the thing does not happen or come to pass, that is the thing which the LORD has not spoken" (Deuteronomy 18:22).

Because the word spoken by Isaiah was fulfilled it proves that he was a true prophet of God. Within a short time of his prophecy Jerusalem was saved. There are other prophecies in the Bible which are referred to as medium term; they were fulfilled after the life time of the prophet.

Many of those concern the coming of the Jewish Messiah and his rejection by the people (see especially Isaiah chapter 53), events which were fulfilled some 600 years after Isaiah's days. As we live after the fulfilment of those events we know that they came to pass precisely as predicted, which gives us further reassurance.

Unfulfilled Prophecy

For Isaiah made many other predictions, about events that reach right down to our day. These long-term prophecies still await fulfilment, but because of the accuracy of the short and medium-term prophecies we can have complete confidence in their fulfilment.

Isaiah and God's other prophets accurately foretold the return of the scattered Jewish people to their ancient land, an event which many of us have seen fulfilled during our lifetime. But they also predicted the eventual outcome of that return. Here are some of Isaiah's prophecies about a coming King and Kingdom:

"For unto us a Child is born, unto us a Son is given; and the government will be upon His shoulder ... Of the increase of his government and peace there will be no end, upon the throne of David and over his kingdom, to order it and establish it with judgment and justice from that time forward, even forever. The zeal of the LORD of hosts will perform this" (9:6-7);

"They shall not hurt nor destroy in all my holy mountain, for the earth shall be full of the knowledge of the LORD as the waters cover the sea" (11:9);

"Rejoice with Jerusalem, and be glad with her, all you who love her ... For thus says the LORD: 'Behold, I will extend peace to her like a river, and the glory of the Gentiles like a flowing stream. Then you shall feed; on her sides shall you be carried, and be dandled on her knees'" (66:10-12).

This will be a marvellous time when Jesus will be sent to rule the world, eventually introducing an era when there will be no more war, no illness, no pollution, no financial problems, no food shortages and no death. All these and other dreadful things that we at present encounter day by day will become things of the past and the whole earth will revert to the full beauty it had before man spoilt it.

These are genuine promises made by God, initially to the Jews, but since the time of Jesus they have been extended to include all who believe, are baptised and then live trying to follow the teachings of our Lord.

Human Institutions

Whilst individuals have made major contributions, people tend to look to national or international organisations for major advances. Worldwide institutions, like the United Nations, came into existence to prevent war and to

provide food aid, education and refuge for the poorest peoples, and to protect human rights. The International Monetary Fund gives financial aid and stability to developing countries; and so on. But none of these institutions has been able to solve the many problems our world now faces.

Many people think that, given our sophisticated and technologically advanced civilization, man himself can bring about a world that has lasting peace, with plenty for everybody, and a lifestyle that is environmentally sustainable. But on the basis of what has been accomplished in the past 50 years, do you really believe that to be possible? If you do, you must be a real optimist!

Heaven-Sent

Have you thought that there could be an alternative? If so, do you know where to find out about it? Looking closely at God's Word, the Holy Bible, should give you some pleasant surprises and a lot of hope for the future. As explained in the previous article in this issue, the prophets who were inspired by God have foretold that better times are coming when a heaven-sent King reigns in Jerusalem over a new govern-

ment. But the Bible also tells us not to be too hopeful about the plans of mankind:

"Do not put your trust in princes, nor in a son of man, in whom there is no help. His spirit departs, he returns to his earth; In that very day his plans perish" (Psalm 146:3,4).

All men and women have only a limited time in which to

achieve anything worthwhile, for then they die. But, says the Psalmist:

"Happy is he who has the God of Jacob for his help, whose hope is in the LORD his God" (146:5).

If we put our trust in God, the Maker of heaven and earth, He can rid the world of oppression and wickedness and provide for hungry and disadvantaged people. Read the rest of Psalm 146 to see what God intends to do. It gives us a glimpse of the wonderful worldwide kingdom that God intends to establish on earth and which will replace the rule of man on Earth.

Jesus is Coming

You might wonder how and when God will bring all this about. The Lord Jesus Christ is to return in person from heaven to establish God's new society on earth, for Jesus is the true saviour of the world. After the crucifixion of Jesus and his marvellous resurrection angels reassured his early followers about this very promise:

"Men of Galilee, why do you stand gazing up into heaven? This same Jesus, who was taken up from you into heaven, will so come in like manner as you saw him go into heaven" (Acts 1:11).

Jesus Christ is the only man who has been made immortal, so when he returns to earth he will have no fear of anything or anyone. He will be sole king, sole ruler and quite unable to be overthrown. So we can take heart. Earth will not disintegrate because of nuclear war. Its inhabitants will not be wiped out because of famine or disease. One of the clearest signs has been the regathering of the Jewish people to their homeland, the setting up of the State of Israel just over 60 years ago and Jerusalem being made its undivided capital city.

told in the Bible, and we are told what the eventual outcome will be. Jesus accurately predicted the state of our world and the anxiety that would prevail, with people full of fear for the future. This is just how many, many people across the world are feeling right now, vulnerable, insecure and in fear and seeing no future for themselves or their children. But then he added a word to believers - men and women who have heeded the warnings and have done something about it: "Now when these things begin to happen, look up and lift up your heads, because your redemption draws near" (Luke 21:28).

Personal Invitation

When Jesus comes back to the earth he will invite those to be with him who have believed in his words and have been waiting for him. He is coming to save the world, but he can be your Saviour too, here and now. From the beginning of his ministry his message was that we must repent, because the Kingdom of God is near. Christ died so that all who believe on him should not perish but have everlasting life in his Kingdom.

If we ignore his call we shall not be part of the new world order that God will establish. Jesus asks us to change our ways and our thinking (this is the meaning of the word "repent"). His death can save us even though we are sinners. We need to put our trust or faith in God. If we are willing to change, and demonstrate this by being baptised – by immersion in water – and if we will re-order our lives for the future then we have the promise that Jesus will welcome us into his Kingdom.

The Natural World

Sitting in my office tapping out these words I can see over the fence into my neighbour's yard where his store-cattle are quietly munching silage.

Beyond the yard, meadows slope down to a river shrouded in willows that are fast turning green in the Spring sunshine. It's a scene that has remained largely unchanged for hundreds of years – not only beautiful but elo-



quent of our relationship with the land and our eternal dependence on nature for survival.

The privilege of living in or near the countryside in the south west of England has been mine from childhood. I grew up surrounded by the sights, sounds and smells of the natural world at a time when, for me, there was unrestricted access to its delights and far fewer people about. With this background it is hardly surprising that an awareness, however vague, of the creative, sustaining hand of an all-powerful God should have been my unquestioning view. It remains so, though now through a Bible believer's eye.

Conflicting Views

With this year's bicentenary of the birth of Charles Darwin the debate between evolutionists and creationists has come to prominence, exposing heightened passions on behalf of the former and a kind of dogged but growing revival by the latter. Why, one wonders, should the evolutionist be so concerned to convert believers and to

what? What benefit is there? Do they pose some threat?

Of course, at the heart of the matter is the interpretation of the origin of the natural world. The quite splendid nature films that now come from places all over the world reveal again and again the same patterns, the same breathtaking handiwork as I see through my window. Viewing the unmistakeable evidence for a Creator whilst lis-

tening to the authoritative tones of a commentator ascribing it all to evolution is bizarre and, often, ludicrous.

It seems that the pursuit of Darwin's theory is really an attempt to disprove the existence of God – that 'atheism' is the objective, rather than the increase of knowledge by 'research'. Perhaps there is evidence for this in the slogan, "There probably isn't a God – now stop worrying and enjoy your life", posted on some city buses. It says more about the ignorance of the advertisers than their targeted audience if they are suggesting that belief in God causes worry and is an obstacle to enjoyment.

The Book of Faith

A major problem for both sides is that there are few Bible believers with a sufficient knowledge of science to argue their case in the evolutionist's camp. And probably there are still fewer scientists who are well enough acquainted with the Scriptures to

argue against them rather than against what they are thought to teach.

The simple fact is that the Bible is the book of faith, and faith is of no use in the work of science. But faith, along with hope and love, forms an integral part of the human experience.

We exist as physical creatures who are able to see, touch and taste, but the unseen things of faith, hope and love are equally real and vital ingredi-

ents of the human being, setting us apart as unique in the animal world. How could they be the result of evolution? Where did they come from? The evolution theory gives no answer; but the Bible does.

A real and living hope

"God created man in his own image; in the image of God he created him; male and female he created them" (Genesis 1:27).

These words from the Genesis account of the Creation reveal that the uniqueness of human beings lies in their capacity to appreciate and to imitate the character of God Himself. When we take a closer look we discover that faith in God can give us a real and living hope, which is why the apostle Paul prays for the believers in Rome:

"Now may the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, that you may abound in hope" (Romans 15:13).

The all-powerful Creator of the heavens and earth is not just raw power – a frightening proposition

indeed. The Bible reveals God as a loving God, and much more. He is the epitome of love:

"He who does not love does not know God, for God is love. In this the love of God was manifested toward us, that God has sent His only begotten Son into the world, that we might live through him ... And we have known and believed the love that God has for us. God is love, and he who abides in

love abides in God, and God in him" (1 John 4:8-9,16).

Worship God

Looking through the window at my neighbour's cattle I recall God's own words expressed by the Psalmist:

"Hear, O my people, and I will speak, O Israel, and I will testify against you; I am God, your God! ... I will not take a bull from your house, nor goats out of your folds. For every beast of the forest is mine, and the cattle on a

thousand hills. I know all the birds of the mountains, and the wild beasts of the field are mine".

And then the Psalmist explains what we can do for such a mighty and all-providing God:

"... Offer to God thanksgiving, and pay your vows to the Most High" (Psalm 50:7-14).

Our careful observation of the natural world and a close look at what God has revealed in the Bible lead us to one unavoidable conclusion. The God who made the world and who has given us life is a God who deserves our worship!

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Creation, Evolution and Charles Darwin

This year has witnessed the 200th anniversary of the birth of Charles Darwin and the 150th anniversary of the publication of his book "On the Origin of Species", with a sub-title "The preservation of favoured races in the struggle for life".

Descent

In 1871 Darwin published "The Descent of Man" in which he proposed human evolution and the unity of all races of human kind. Darwin was the grandson of Josiah Wedgwood who, with his family, fought for the abolition of the slave trade. Darwin's letters to his grandparents were discovered recently during exploration of the Wedgwood archives. 1 These showed the depth

of Darwin's feelings on the evil of the slave trade which led him to write "The Descent of Man".

Darwin was also much influenced by the writings of Thomas Malthus on the problems of increasing population in a world of finite resources. Malthus predicted that this would lead to wars and famine. Accordingly, Darwin's views on "the survival of the fittest" allowed him to approve of colonial genocide, such as the deliberate wiping out of the aboriginal inhabitants of Tasmania by

European settlers. A recent television programme on "Darwin's dangerous idea" noted that his views were taken up in Nazi Germany. Gypsies, criminals, the mentally deficient and six million Jews were exterminated. About 250,000 people with hereditary disease were sent to the gas chambers while others were

bers, while others were compulsorily sterilised.

Designed

The Bible teaches that life was created by God. It is noteworthy that the six fundamental physiconstants have cal exactly the values required to ensure that the universe has a planet capable of sustaining life. If the value of just one of these funconstants, damental such as the speed of light, had been just slightly different then no planet suitable for life

planet suit would have been formed.

The simplest interpretation of this strong anthropic principle is that the universe was designed by a Creator who intended that it should be populated by intelligent life. The physicist Paul Davies writes "The impression of design in the universe is overwhelming".²

Charles Darwin was very concerned over the absence in the fossil record of

life forms intermediate between species. Evolution is supposed to have occurred over countless millions of years, with species gradually changing into more complex forms of life. In how many cases has clear, watertight, incontrovertible evidence been found for the existence of fossils corresponding to intermediate species?

Abandoned

The complete lack of such evidence led Eldredge and Gould³ to abandon Darwinism and to suggest the theory of "Punctuated equilibrium". They proposed that most species underwent little change over long time periods, but when this did happen it occurred very rapidly in a limited number of places. This, they argued, explains why fossil evidence for intermediate species will be hard to find.

But what is the evolutionary driving force of incipient changes in species?

Such changes can be of no value, for only when the changes are complete will the organism be better fitted for survival. For example, an eye will only be of value when it is fully formed and linked to a brain that has been modified to

accept signals from light sensitive tissue. Gould pointed out that this is a primary problem for evolution because incipient structures are useless, unless natural selection could look ahead.

Complexity

Believers in Creation argue that the amazing complexity of life provides evidence for the work of a great designer.^{4,5} Today we are more aware of this as a consequence of our much

greater knowledge of biological science. For example, the swimming of bacteria is due to flagellar motors that rotate at 100,000 rpm. The flagellar motor is made up of 30 protein components that carry out functions equivalent to the components of modern engine design, although mechanical engines cannot begin to match the efficiency of the bacterial motors. But what could be the evolutionary driving force for the formation of these proteins? Individually they confer no advantage to be preserved by "natural selection". They have no value until the motor is fully complete, with all 30 components present. So this motor could not be formed by evolution. It has to be made by the action of an intelligent being, the original designer.

Simple Cell?

Similarly a living cell could not form by

accident. Consider the processes needed for a typical cell to function, involving the making and controlled activity of enzymes and other proteins, carbohydrates and nucleic acids: the synthesis of cell walls, with intricate multiple mechanisms for controlling the

uptake and efflux of nutrients and metal ions. This is the work of a Creator.

These arguments for an intelligent designer are demonstrated powerfully in the properties of DNA, the molecules in our cells that carry our personal genetic code. Richard Dawkins wrote that the machine code of the genes is uncannily computer-like, and, later, "Genes are digitally coded text". So, we have to ask who



designed and programmed DNA? Francis Crick (who, with Watson, established the double helical structure of DNA) described DNA as a miracle that could not have been formed by accident. He proposed that DNA was made by a supreme intelligence in some other galaxy and, somehow, it arrived on planet earth.

After a lifetime of atheism, the philosopher Anthony Flew believes that the evidence leads conclusively to the fact that there is a God. He asked himself this gues-"How tion: did the first reproducing creature ever get its DNA?" He wrote subsequently that the rationality of the universe convinced him that there is a God, who wrote the laws of nature.6

So there are good reasons for believing in a God who created life. This means that there is purpose in life and, consequently, important questions for us all to ask.

Have Faith!

Faith in Daily Life

In our day-to-day life we have to have faith and belief in people. For example, you have faith that:

- teachers will give you correct and true information so you can build your knowledge on it;
- the person who gives you assurances of love will enter into an intimate relationship with you, because a good marriage is based on loyalty and faithfulness.

So you see, the things we are most sure about in everyday life begin simply by an act of faith and trust.

Faith in God

Now true Christians have faith and trust in God. Some people may say "How can you put faith in someone you can't see?" Yet we have seen how faith exists in daily life.

Consider the chef once again. You

didn't see him or her in the kitchen, but you saw the results of his work in the plates of food on the tables. In the same way we can't see God, but we can see the work of His hands in Creation.

We have never seen Sir Christopher Wren, but we believe he existed. For if you go to London you can see evidence that he existed when you look at St Paul's Cathedral. It was designed and planned by him. He organised the builders, they got the materials and it was created. We can see it today and recognise it as Sir Christopher Wren's design, trusting and having absolute faith that the information is true and correct.

The Evidence

The natural world around us, such as birds, plants and animals, is truly amazing.

- How can a great oak tree grow from a small acorn?
- The birth of a child is a miracle.
- The flight of a bird and their migration to the other side of the world is amazing.

To us they are all indicators of a great Designer and Creator. The laws of nature are all in place to make these things happen. The oak seed needs soil, water, warmth and light and they are provided. The birth and development of a baby from a fertilised egg and the formation of cells to produce a child works in a sequence that is still

not fully understood. And the birds know how to navigate by the moon and stars to get to Africa, as though that knowledge was already programmed into their design.

We think these natural phenomena provide strong evidence that God is the great Creator of life. Just as St Paul's Cathedral is strong evidence that Sir Christopher Wren existed, the natural world is a testimony

to God's existence and the Bible says that very thing. Writing to the Romans the apostle Paul said:

"Since the creation of the world, His invisible attributes are clearly seen, being understood by the things that are made, even His eternal power and Godhead" (Romans 1:20).

And he goes on to say that people are "without excuse" if they fail to recognise this, and worship God their Creator. So we are expected to take note of what we see around us and respond to it in an appropriate way.

More Evidence

As we have already seen in this issue, if the evidence of nature isn't enough, God has given us His Word the Bible. There we can read prophecies about the Jews and about many other nations, the majority of which have already come to pass.

As we cannot forecast the future with any certainty, such things must come from God. The historical truth of the Bible also comes to light as archaeologists dig to look into the past and expose sites and artefacts which back up the Bible record. For example, in the nineteenth century there was much doubt expressed about the existence of Babylon, which is frequently mentioned in the Bible. Now that archaeologists have found the city, no such challenges are heard!

Believing is doing

So if you believe in God, what's the next step? In the same way that you trust the chef whom you have not seen, by eating the meal he or she has produced, the next step is to take action. Your faith will then live in your life.

In Hebrews 11 we read about men

and women who had strong faith and trust in God. They were confident in His existence, His power and His promises. Their faith meant something to them and produced action to do what was right. They were men and women of action, not words.

- Abraham left a settled life and set out into the wilderness in search of a land he had never seen before.
- Noah built a huge boat in the middle of the dry land, being persuaded that the flood God warned him about would surely come.
- Moses refused to be called the son of Pharaoh's daughter, choosing rather to suffer affliction with the people of God.

These faithful men were absolutely convinced that what God had said was true, so much so that it affected their lives and how they behaved. These were not easy things to do, but their absolute faith and belief in God moved them to act accordingly. This is what we are told:

"These all died in faith, not having received the promises, but having seen them afar off were assured of them, embraced them, and confessed that they were strangers and pilgrims on the earth" (Hebrews 11:13).

Why was Abraham so sure of the unknown land? Because he was utterly sure of the unseen God. Ordinary people like us did extraordinary things because of their absolute faith in God. So what about us?

"Without faith it is impossible to please Him, for he who comes to God must believe that He is, and that He is a rewarder of those who diligently seek Him" (Hebrews 11:6).

Being Born Again

The phrase, 'a born again Christian' is one that is frequently applied to people who have had an 'experience' in their lives which convinces them that they need to devote themselves to Christ. It could come about as the result of going to a gathering, such as those promoted by a prominent minister such as Billy Graham, or it might be a personal experience that convinces someone to devote themselves to Jesus. Whatever the occasion, the person so influenced feels driven to commit his or her life to Christ.

Bible Teaching

If we examine the way in which the Bible uses this phrase we find that it crops up in the narrative between Jesus and Nicodemus, a Jewish theologian, as recorded in John chapter 3. Tracking down the context enables us to find out what Jesus was teaching in these verses. That is always a helpful way of making sure that our understanding accords with Bible teaching. Nicodemus evidently had a high opinion of Jesus for his opening words

indicated that he and his fellow Jewish leaders recognised something important:

"Rabbi, we know that you are a teacher come from God; for no one can do these signs that you do unless God is with him" (John 3:2).

These remarkable words show that he believed Jesus to be the Messiah – who had

"come from God" – and that the miracles Jesus had performed confirmed that. Jesus responded by saying, in effect: "If you want to be in my kingdom you must be 'born again'". Here are his actual words:

"Most assuredly, I say to you, unless one is born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God" (3:3).

We see from this verse that being 'born again' is linked with being in 'the Kingdom of God.' We cannot be a part of that Kingdom, unless we are born again and this is why it is vital that we understand exactly what 'being born again' actually means.

"Born of water"

Nicodemus mistook what Jesus was saying for, in verse 4, he says how impossible it is to be born a second time in a literal sense. So Jesus repeats the point that he has already made by explaining:

"Most assuredly, I say to you, unless one is born of water and the Spirit, he cannot enter the kingdom of God" (3:5).

What exactly is Jesus saying here? First of all, being 'born of water' is a reference to baptism. When we are baptized we go into the water with all our sins clinging to us, but when we come out of the water, our sins are all forgiven. We are then spotless in the eyes of the Lord because our sins have been symbolically



washed away. This is a reference to the death and rising to life of the Lord Jesus (see Romans 6:3-4).

So to comply with the command of Jesus, being 'born again' means that we have to pass through the waters of baptism. Baptism – a burial or dipping in water - is a simple act of obedience that is discussed in these pages. It is simple, but it is vitally important because through that act we associate ourselves with the

Lord Jesus.

But what about being born of the spirit – what exactly does that mean? Well, it cannot mean that we receive the Holy Spirit at our baptisms. Jesus was talking to Nicodemus some three years before the Holy Spirit was given to his apostles during the Feast of Pentecost. Furthermore, in verse 10, Jesus tells Nicodemus that being the master (or teacher) of Israel he should have known these things already!

The key to what Jesus is saying is to be seen in v.7, where he says that one is 'born again' – or 'from above', as the margin puts it. Being 'born of the spirit' means coming to believe in Divine teaching as a result of listening to the words of Jesus, and of his Father in Heaven, and then letting their teaching change our lives. Today, the words of God and His Son, the Lord Jesus, are recorded in His Word, the Bible. We can read and understand them and should make them the basis of our Christianity.

So how are we 'born of the spirit' in this 21st Century? It is when we respond to the words of God and His Son, Jesus, by reading the Bible – the Word of God – and being convinced by them. This means that our whole life will be changed. Instead of living to satisfy ourselves (the Bible calls that "the works of the flesh"), we will live to please God and our fellow believers – what the Bible calls "the fruit of the Spirit" (Galatians 5:19-24).

New Lifestyle

Describing this change of behaviour in another of his letters, the apostle Paul describes it as putting off the works of the flesh – what he calls "the old man" – and putting on "the new man" of the spirit. Here are his actual words:

"... that you put off, concerning your former conduct, the old man which grows corrupt according to the deceitful lusts, and be renewed in the spirit of your mind, and that you put on the new man which was created according to God, in righteousness and true holiness" (Ephesians 4:22-24).

So if you want to be a 'born again' Christian, in the way the Bible describes that term, you need to be baptized by full immersion in water and then understand and demonstrate in your life the full truths of God as presented in the Bible. If you want to enter the coming Kingdom of God, which Jesus will establish at his Return from heaven, just remember what Jesus told Nicodemus:

"Most assuredly, I say to you, unless one is born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God" (John 3:3).
